The following questions are part of the online application. We suggest drafting responses ahead of time to copy and paste into the application when completing it.

1. Why do you want to become an ACE Educator?
2. How would becoming an ACE Educator complement your current scope of work?
3. Please describe your experience facilitating presentations and public speaking.
4. Your role as an ACE Educator is going to require a time commitment – how would this work within your current schedule/commitments?
5. Talking about adverse childhood experiences and trauma can be emotionally triggering for trainers and for audience members. What strategies would you use to manage your own emotions and to respond to the emotional responses of others during challenging conversations? If relevant, please give an example of strategies that you've found useful in the past.
6. Awareness of self (and your own biases), social awareness, and emotional management skills are essential to the success of an ACE Educator. Please describe instances where you had to employ these skills in your professional and/or personal experience.
7. ACE Educators are expected to take a proactive role in reaching audiences to provide trainings, as well as respond to requests for presentations from the Program Coordinator or designee. What is your ability to generate presentation opportunities?
8. ACE Educators not only provide training on ACEs and resilience science, they also to act as drivers and instigators of change. What level of influence or decision-making power do you have at your current position, within systems or in your community? (while a degree of influence and decision-making power will strengthen your application, it is not necessary for consideration)
9. What is your understanding of the social determinants of health, and how race impacts health disparities in Louisiana?
